HealthHIV. Data extracted from REDCap on May 6, 2026.

Sample composition. The survey instrument routes respondents through one of two parallel forms based on a single feeder question. Of 745 records, 373 (50.1%) routed to the consumer form (people aging with HIV), 341 (45.8%) routed to the provider form (healthcare workforce), 30 (4.0%) selected "Neither of the above," and 1 record had no feeder response. All percentages within the consumer survey are computed against N = 373; all percentages within the provider survey are computed against N = 341, except where skip-logic produced a smaller eligible denominator, in which case the question-specific N is shown.

Note on age questions. The consumer form contains two age-related items: a categorical eligibility item (Are you 50 years or older?) and a free-text current age field (Please list your current age:). The provider form contains a single categorical age-band item (What is your age?). The feeder form does not include an age question. All three items are reported below in their respective sections.

Note on multi-select items. For "Select all that apply" questions, each option is reported as the count and percentage of respondents in the relevant section who selected that option. Percentages do not sum to 100. REDCap system-default codes (Asked but unknown, Unknown, Invalid, No information) are suppressed throughout. The "Not applicable" option is shown only when it appears as a respondent-visible survey choice with at least one selection.

Note on duplicated items. Two REDCap fields ask "How long have you been living with HIV?" within the consumer form (a primary path and a secondary branch). These are merged in the table below and reported once with the combined denominator.
